Federal Blues Inc. (FBI) was formed in early January 2014 by a group of residents of the Byron hinterland village of Federal (hence the name) with a shared love of the BLUES. After quickly establishing a following in the Byron area, they formed 'The Blues Club' at Bangalow Bowling Club, which in 2019 expanded and moved to Ballina RSL, and from 2023 onwards staged performances every Sunday with FBI as the 'House Band'.

FBI plays a mixture of originals and blues classics, drawing from old masters such as Muddy Waters and BB King, plus more contemporary artists like Eric Clapton, Gary Clark Jnr., Joe Louis Walker and Robin Ford. The result is an exciting, dynamic and passionate blues experience.

Will be at the Pottsville Tavern 12 noon, on Tuesday 19th November.


Choose from the regular menu, which includes a selection of senior's specials. Finish off with Di's cake.

Monkey Pox (Mpox) — just a few points for those who are interested, or fear that we have a 'new' pandemic looming. (It is just a brief overview).

The monkey pox virus was first identified in 1958 amongst research monkeys in Denmark. The first human case in 1970 was a 9 month old boy in the Democratic Republic of the Congo during an intense period of trying to eliminate smallpox. It was thought that the virus was transferred from animal to human through bites or scratches.

Two strains of mpox are clade 1, the more severe with a fatality rate of 3.6%, and clade 2 is less severe with fatalities of less than 0.2%. The most vulnerable are poor and malnourished, with clade 1 currently spreading in Sub-Saharan Africa and refugee camps. Wealthier countries have greater access to vaccines and antivirals which mitigate the disease, although immunosuppressed individuals still need to avoid risky exposure. It is also listed as a sexually transmitted disease. Infections like RSV, influenza and COVID-19 are more prevalent and problematic than mpox, which is usually mild and people generally recover within a few weeks.

As with other infectious diseases, follow the known preventative measures – particularly hand hygiene and safe distancing. Although there has been media alarm that World Health Organisation (WHO) has called the mpox outbreak, a public health emergency, the current WHO statement does not recommend any restrictions for travel or trade.
